# Come and Have Breakfast

Two weeks ago, we had a special "Asset Mapping" event after Sunday worship in the church, led by our friends at Partners for Sacred Places. About sixty people attended, more than filling the tables we'd set up in the chapel.

Folks had a great time.

There was the simple joy of sharing a meal together, something we had not done as a church family since the pandemic began.

And then there was the joy of taking stock of what was right with us and our great church.

Our friends from Partners asked each of us to name *assets* of the church and write them on Post-It Notes.

Hundreds of notes went up all around the room.

That's right. Our members named hundreds of things that are right with us.

Then Partners asked us to group the notes around ideas that might be acted upon.

Last, Partners asked us to "vote with our feet," and stand next to the idea that seemed most appealing.

Perhaps it shouldn't be a surprise that our members identified a food ministry as one of the top two ideas. The other was to use our beautiful space for performance and cultural events.

When our forebears built our building over a century ago, they wisely included a large space to feed the people of the city. Today, our members still recognize the cafeteria as one of our greatest assets, and a food ministry as one of our greatest opportunities.

Our preaching text this week from John 21 gives us insight into the reasons why.

At the end of John's Gospel, Jesus gave the disciples a world-changing mission. But what did they do? They went fishing.

But without Jesus they caught nothing.

But Jesus wasn't angry with them. He called to them from the shore: "Have you any fish? Cast your net on the other side."

The net nearly broke from the miraculous catch.

Then Jesus invited them to "Come and have breakfast" and to "Bring some of the fish you caught. The campfire breakfast was a heavenly banquet.

The Lord was at the meal, but he was focused on his guests. He even fed them with his own hands. It's how Jesus does hospitality.

It's what he created us for, too.

<sup>7</sup>How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation, who say to Zion, "Your God reigns!" <sup>8</sup>Listen! Your watchmen lift up their voices; together they shout for joy. When the LORD returns to Zion, they will see it with their own eyes. <sup>9</sup>Burst into songs of joy together, you ruins of Jerusalem, for the LORD has comforted his people. he has redeemed Jerusalem. <sup>10</sup> The LORD will lay bare his holy arm in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth will see the salvation of our God.

### Scripture Reading: John 21:1-14

Afterward Jesus appeared again to his disciples, by the Sea of Galilee. It happened this way: <sup>2</sup>Simon Peter, Thomas (also known as Didymus), Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two other disciples were together. <sup>3</sup> "I'm going out to fish," Simon Peter told them, and they said, "We'll go with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup>Early in the morning, Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> He called out to them, "Friends, haven't you any fish?"

<sup>&</sup>quot;No," they answered.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>6</sup>He said, "Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some." When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the large number of fish.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>7</sup>Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, "It is the Lord," he wrapped his outer garment around him (for he had taken it off) and jumped into the water. <sup>8</sup>The other disciples followed in the boat, towing the net full of fish, for they were not far from shore, about a hundred yards. <sup>[c]</sup> <sup>9</sup>When they landed, they saw a fire of burning coals there with fish on it, and some bread.

<sup>10</sup> Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you have just caught." <sup>11</sup> So Simon Peter climbed back into the boat and dragged the net ashore. It was full of large fish, 153, but even with so many the net was not torn. <sup>12</sup> Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." None of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. <sup>13</sup> Jesus came, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. <sup>14</sup> This was now the third time Jesus appeared to his disciples after he was raised from the dead.

In keeping with FPCP's centuries' long faithfulness to mission and outreach, the Missions Committee, with Session approval, is asking members and friends to support the annual special offering to missions. This year, your gifts will be allocated equally between Refuge for Women and Garden Home Ministries. As our awareness of human trafficking in the Pittsburgh region grows, we welcome the opportunity to respond by supporting organizations that are meeting the needs of those who have been exploited and kept in dangerous conditions.



Since March, members of the Missions Committee, Rev. Dan Turis and others have been talking with Theresa Golden, Director of Refuge for Women and Sharlene Dominick, Director of Garden Home Ministries. We have listened to their visions and visited the residences they operate. We find their personal statements of faith and sense of mission to be outstanding. These two organizations



embody the full spectrum of care for trafficked women. Refuge for Women currently focuses on providing immediate access to temporary housing, crisis intervention and other forms of support for female survivors of trafficking. Garden Home Ministries provides stability, resources, and accountability in a home setting for women who desire to break the cycle of homelessness, addiction, exploitation, and trafficking.
